Indoor Masking Required at BUSD Beginning Monday, May 23

Our collective goal in the final weeks of school is to ensure the last two weeks and accompanying celebrations can be attended by as many of our students and families as possible. We are experiencing high-levels-of-COVID in our schools and community this week, and because of this strong recommendation from the City of Berkeley Public Health Officer, **BUSD will reinstate mandated indoor masking on Monday, May 23.** All students and staff are required to wear masks indoors, regardless of vaccination status.

Testing Residential households in the U.S. are again eligible to receive 8 free, at-home tests which <u>can be ordered at this link</u>. This is a new round of test distribution and you are eligible even if you have previously ordered tests through this program. We will continue with Wednesday testing at school.

Multicultural Night Potluck on Sunday, May 22nd, 4-6:30pm on the yard at school!

You don't want to miss this fun PTA sponsored event! Families can bring a potluck dish (for 8-10 people or more) to share. PTA will give out tickets at the gate so every kid can get a dessert treat, everyone will be able to do fun activities (including a crafts table for making flags representative of one's family tradition) and enjoy world music played by Washington's own DJs Leaks n' Marquis.



Pride at Washington School, 2022 This Year's Theme: Live out Loud. Be You. Be proud.

- **What is Pride?** Pride, held in June, is a month of celebration and action in the LGBTQ+ community (lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer; the "+" represents the infinite forms of gender identity).
- All families should celebrate Pride: Here's why
- You show love to your own family. One never knows where one's journey of gender and family will lead. By celebrating Pride, you show your children and loved ones that you love them always!
- You show love to others in your community. By celebrating Pride, you help LGBTQ+ individuals and families to feel seen, accepted, and welcomed. You teach your kids to be open to all.
- You make LGBTQ+ topics comfortable for everyone. You demonstrate that it is


acceptable, natural, and healthy to talk about gender identity and family diversity, and that it is not something to keep quiet about or something that applies only to "other" people.

- All families should celebrate Pride: *Here's how* Attend Pride celebrations. Details for Washington's celebrations are on the following page. San Francisco's Pride Parade is June 26 this year, and events throughout the Bay Area can be found online.
- Take the opportunity to have a conversation. You can show your support simply by asking your child how Washington's Pride celebrations went! Or, make a dinnertime toast to Pride, and start a conversation about how we love and celebrate people with every kind of gender expression, relationship, and family. You can talk about how LGBTQ+ people have happy, wonderful lives. It can be helpful to talk about how LGBTQ+ individuals have been around in every time and every place in history, and we live in an exciting time when more LGBTQ+ people are out. You can bring up connections to other movements that promote rights in terms of race, ethnicity, religion, and disability. Read about and celebrate renowned LGBTQ+ individuals, from Audre Lorde to Oscar Wilde, Janelle Monáe, Queen Latifah, and James Baldwin.
- Say "Happy Pride" or make a "Happy Pride" card. Get creative to show your love and acceptance to family members and friends.
- **Make or buy a rainbow flag.** The usual colors are: red (symbolizing life), orange (healing), yellow (sunlight), green (nature), blue (art), and purple (serenity). Some flags add brown and black lines to represent people of color, as well as pink, white, and blue lines for trans pride.
- Read a book about LGBTQ+ individuals and diversity.
- Washington community members recommend these books as wonderful conversation starters. Many more can be found by Googling "LGBTQ+ children's books."




The Family Book by Todd Parr

A story of strength unlimited by gender expectations. Ages 5-8.








Melissa by Alex Gino
